


Super Cecision Making News YES

SDMNY Project Coordinator Stephanie Penceal reported on the enthusiasm of families and prospective Decision-Makers alike. Parents found the pending SDMA law, and the likelihood that decisions made pursuant to SDMAs would be legislatively recognized, an important consideration in thinking about SDM as an alternative to guardianship. Here's what one parent had to say:

"What brought me over to the table...I wanted to see what you guys offer... people need to understand that not every child is severely disabled where they can't be in charge of their own say, so this is extremely important, that... childrenas they become adults, can make decisions with support."

We've been very successful with students from this program in the past (see Good News [2/26/2021]) and the opportunity to meet a whole new crew was energizing and inspiring.
